



The Maidens Monitor (Oct-Dec 2024)

The Making Maidens Weight producer demonstration site (PDS) is exploring ways to improve lamb marking rates from maiden ewes in central west Queensland. Conception rates of maidens in the region are generally good, however, converting these foetuses to lambs remains a challenge. The demonstration properties are exploring condition scoring, weighing, supplementation, scanning and udder assessment of ewes to improve their marking percentage. As part of this, demonstration sites are collecting individual animal data with electronic identification (eID) in large-scale, commercial operations and highlighting how this data is useful for decision-making.

How are we using WhatsApp?

The Making Maidens Weight WhatsApp chat continues to be a great way for producers to engage with the PDS. This quarter was quieter in the chat with discussion centring on supplementation and containment feeding decisions.

Demonstration sites

Both demonstration sites have been busy leading up to joining, collecting weights and body condition scores (BCS) of ewes. For Dunblane, the decision around continuing to feed all weaners in the yards or to release the heavier ewe lambs into the paddock with grain feeders was explored. Important considerations factoring into the decision includes:

- o Amount of grain on hand
- When summer rains might arrive
- o Can containment feeding be managed
- Cash flow situation (cost of feed)
- Is agistment an option? E.g. looking at the current markets, is agisting light lambs an option to focus on feeding heavy ewe lambs at home to set them up for joining next year?

SME Dr Gordon Refshauge (NSW DPIRD) reminded the group that reproduction has been hampered this year, so it is crucial to minimise losses as much as possible to retain flock structure and the numbers for selection. Looking after light ewes is particularly important in seasons following poor lambing.

Topics of discussion in the chat

Nutrition & supplementation – key messages

- Commence feeding early, while pastures still have some nutritional value (i.e. still have some green). Supplementing early makes best use of the pasture and feeding smaller lambs requires less supplement, which is cheaper than trying to put condition back on animals that have been in a deficit.
- Ewes must be in a positive energy balance at least 2 weeks prior to joining. Understand the energy provided by the pasture and the gap that needs to be made up from supplementary energy.
- Ensure ewes are gaining weight leading into joining as a maintenance ration will not support adequate reproduction outcomes.

- Green pick from early falls of rain will provide light ewes a good boost in nutrition before joining.
- Ensure protein and energy requirements are being met. Ewe weaners need to be growing consistently and as much as possible before they're joined as older lambs. Consequences of poor growth in the weaner phase of life can result in lost lifetime productivity and reproduction.
